Mauricio Cristobal Cortes Fuentes - *Chile*

Mauricio has been busy sharing his knowledge with area students. He had the opportunity to work with some talented ladies from Beaumont School when they came to Zygote to create monoprints and letter-pressed prints. He also recently spoke with about 50 students from Cleveland Institute of Art's "Lunch on Fridays" lecture series.

Mauricio has also been making connections in the community. He met Todd Pownell and Debra Rosen from TAP Studios, a jewelry metals production shop. At the closing of the "They Came, They Saw, They Printed" exhibition, he listened to a wonderful and informative panel discussion featuring Barbara Tannenbaum, curator of photography at the Cleveland Museum of Art, and local art dealer William Busta. The conversation ranged from building an art collection to the artist's process of archiving their own work. Antonia continues to work with Saint Martin de Porres High School in instant photography and photogram workshops taught by local photography instructor Heather Murray. The students' work will be part of the Creative Fusion culminating exhibition. Antonia is also planning a two-day self-portrait and photogram workshop with students from the Westside Community House's Sisterhood Program in May.

Antonia recently visited another Creative Fusion partner, Lake Erie Ink, to discuss Chilean culture and collage photography with students in the after-school program there. She will be working with the students for five weeks in April and May, and the Lake Erie Ink students will also construct work for the final exhibition in May.

One of Antonia's works was included in the "Third Person" portraiture exhibition at the CPR gallery on March 20th, which featured 25 different artists and their work. Antonia is currently working on her exhibition, opening May 14th, where she will show the work she has completed in Cleveland.

Mkrtich Tonoyan - Armenia

Mkrtich is rapidly building a circle of Armenian-American friends in Cleveland, who have been taking him out for drinks and inviting him over for dinner. Several of these friends want to help Mkrtich create a permanent sculpture in Cleveland, either in the Waterloo Sculpture Park or near the

After the reception, Mkrtich gave an illustrated talk on the rich history, culture, and eastern Christian religion of Armenia from ancient times through the Genocide and Soviet period. On Easter Sunday, he attended the special service at St. Gregory of Narek and, at the priest's invitation, took the official photographs of the day.

Mkrtich recently delivered a talk to fine art students at Cleveland State University. In coming days, he will be traveling to Denison University to talk to students about his "Military Art." While there, he has also been invited to participate in student critiques by a professor who attended ACOSS, Mkrtich's residency program in Yerevan.

The artists have worked in depth with more than 20,000 elementary, high school, and college students and their art has touched thousands of Greater Cleveland residents through performances, exhibitions, lectures, and personal encounters.

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
