
UNDERSTANDING THE NONPROFIT LANDSCAPE IN CUYAHOGA COUNTY:

NONPROFITS SERVING OLDER ADULTS



In Cuyahoga County, nearly 6,000 nonprofits make up an ecosystem of social impact support. <u>Nonprofits serving</u> <u>Older Adults</u> play a vital role in this ecosystem, encompassing at least 84 organizations who serve seniors as a primary population. Only 19 of these nonprofits serve the Older Adult population exclusively, while other nonprofit industries such as housing, health, education, food security, human services, and 65 more have identified Older Adults as a primary population they serve. 42% of these organizations have an operating budget less than \$200,000 or are operating as a church or religious institution—meaning they are not required to report deeper data to the IRS. This snapshot provides a glimpse of the Older Adult services landscape throughout the county, with a deeper dive into the ~68% of organizations reporting comprehensive data.

NONPROFITS SERVING OLDER ADULTS BY SIZE

Nonprofits serving Older Adults tend to be larger in revenue size and expenses than other nonprofits in Cuyahoga County, with the median revenues being \$476,000 compared to \$172,000 for all nonprofits, and median expenses being \$609,000 annually, more than four times as much as nonprofits in other industries.

Of the ~68% of Older Adult serving nonprofits reporting data, over half (54%) have staff sizes of two or less people, slightly greater than the nonprofit sectors a whole.



Compensation data is reported by organizations with annual revenues of \$200,000 or more and includes only full-time and year-round employees. Although nonprofits serving Older Adults are paying their staff and leadership about 20% higher than the median nonprofit wages in Cuyahoga County, low wages have plagued this particular industry for decades. The higher wages seen here are mostly due to higher wages across the Health nonprofit industry. The COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated existing workforce shortages in the Older Adult care industry, resulting in a 6.7% shrink in the long-term care workforce nationally. Demographic data was not available from a significant enough number of Black and Brown-led organizations to disaggregate pay by race.

¹ Many older adults are supported by food access nonprofits to ensure they have healthy, nutritional meals available, and food security nonprofits tend to have a higher volunteer count than the industry as a whole.

FINANCES

The pandemic had significant effects on the older adult population, with <u>isolation and</u> <u>increased health risks</u> causing concern about safety, alongside increased struggles with food security and access to medical care. <u>Community-based programs</u> that typically provide services to older adults shifted to providing inhome services and delivery options. This financial overview provides detail about organizations who named Older Adults as a primary population they serve.

OVERALL FINANCES BY ORGANIZATION TYPE

REVENUES

Nonprofits serving Older Adults play a significant role in the local economy, generating at least \$537M in annual revenue. While a significant portion of reported Older Adult services nonprofits comes from program service revenue (64%), 19% of all funding comes from government grants which is almost five times the average for Cuyahoga County.



EXPENSES

Nonprofits serving Older Adults on average have greater general office expenses than other nonprofits in Cuyahoga County—making their median expenses per reporting organization higher (\$608,961), compared to the sector as a whole (\$154,000). A majority of the expenditures are on operational expenses (\$112M).



ASSETS

Older Adults services nonprofits make up 1% of the nonprofit sector, and of the total \$51B in nonprofit assets locally, they hold 1.5% (\$863M)—mainly in unrestricted funds.

TOP 5 CAPACITY BUILDING NEEDS FOR NONPROFITS SERVING OLDER ADULTS



KEY FINDINGS:

- Few Nonprofits Provide Exclusively Older Adults Services While Need Grows Rapidly: While some populations, like youth, have entire portions of the nonprofit landscape dedicated to providing them services, Older Adults are primarily served through nonprofits who are providing services to many populations. Of all nonprofits serving primarily Older Adults locally, only 6% are focused on Health (nursing homes, primary health, etc.) and only a handful focused on Housing (assisted living, shelters, etc.). The number of Clevelanders over age 65 who live below the poverty level has grown at least 41% since 2010. In a region with a growing older adult population and <u>one of the highest older adult poverty rates</u> in the country, nonprofits focused on serving older adults in poverty are critical.
- Government Grants Support Many Older Adult Services: Older Adults are served by a variety of nonprofit industries, two of which include Community and Economic Development and Human Services. Both of these industries rely significantly on government grants to support all of their work, and a portion of these funds likely come from the <u>Older Americans Act</u> which provides funding for many services offered by these nonprofits (i.e. nutrition and food delivery programs, caregiver support, transportation, and care management services). The data for this analysis of Older Adult serving nonprofits does not allow for a full picture of how much of each agencies' funds go directly to Older Adult Services, 19% of all the funding these organizations are receiving comes from government grants. This is five times the average for Cuyahoga County nonprofits, and a strong indicator that they are accessing these federal dollars.
